INTRODUCTION

Provider, Sustainer, Savior, Deliverer, Helper; our All-in-All. We see His love for His people, and His sorrow when they reject Him. We also witness His anger, justice, and ultimate discipline for those who disobey, dishonor and reject Him.

THE GLORY OF GOD

Ascribe to the Lord, O clans of the peoples, ascribe to the Lord glory and strength! Ascribe to the Lord the glory due his name; bring an offering and come before him! Worship the Lord in the splendor of holiness

(1 Chronicles 16:28-29)

In him you also are being built together into a dwelling place for God by the Spirit. (Ephesians 2:22)

The Hebrew word for Tabernacle is mishkaⁿ; it means Dwelling Place. We learn in the Old Testament that the Tabernacle was the place where the presence of God was manifested; where He gave direction to His people.

As I watch the progression of the modern church, I fear we've lost the true concept of what the Glory of God is all about. In our corporate worship I wonder if we've become too familiar, so much so that we've lost a sense of awe for the God we serve. In our private time, we often "worship on the run"; we allow our busyness to rob us of precious moments.

What could be greater than being in the presence of the Living God? What could be sweeter than spending one-on-one time basking in the glory of your loving Father? Think about it, just you and God. No cell phones, no demands, no interruptions. God invites us to come into His presence, to dwell (tabernacle) with Him. We were created for His glory and to have fellowship with Him.

Maybe you've never really experienced that kind of time in the Lord's presence; wouldn't now be a good time

to start? Or perhaps you have grown distant and haven't enjoyed those precious moments in a while; wouldn't now be the perfect time to get back to it?

Most of us are familiar with the story of Moses and the burning bush. There is much to be learned from Moses' experience. We learn that when we come into God's presence, we must come fearfully. We must come knowing that when we stand in the midst of His glory, we are standing on holy ground. We must realize that when we stand in the presence of a Holy God there will be nothing
